If he let us go on in such a course would he not be acquiescing in our deviltry? Is the same not true of God who made us and loves us? If he gave us abundance at all times in view of the way we treat him and his laws would ne not be rather encouraging us in our lawless career and hell-bent course? It seems to me that he would.

Then the cure for hard times is to keep the Lord's day holy, to revere the holy name of God, and to worship Him in His holy temple; to obey His laws and to render unto God the things that are God's. This is the whole duty of man. Every one who is doing this is doing his duty to save his country from calamity. Those who are donig otherwise cannot complain. By their evil deeds they are bringing the wrath of God upon our nation. Let every mar get right with God and do his duty.
