Bailey was against State Prohibition and National Prohibition, saying that National Prohibition was unenforcible and a delusion, and State Prohibition a

Bailey Said that the Only Remedy Against the Enemies of the Republic is Independent Adtion. The Slogan: "My Party Right or Wrong," plays Right into the Hands of the Man who Wants it

Bailey said he was an Independent Democrat and further "I Scratched a Judge Once Because He Was a Drunkard. I would Scratch a Drunkard Again. Would You?"

Bailey said "I Am Independent in That I would not vote for Immoral Men or Measures if all the Democratic Parties in the World Should Support Them. I am Independent in the Sense that I owe my Allegiance to my God, and My Conscience and State above the Allegiance that I owe to my Party."
