THE NEW TAX PAYING SYSTEM

The County Commissioners of Halifax County took seriously all that was said recently by the taxpayers of the county regarding lower taxes.

It is easy enough to talk about lowering taxes but when it comes to the actual task of cutting expenses and appropriations, the only way to obtain lower taxes, it is not quite so easy, nor does the public appreciate the difficulties.
