# New Dial Phone Numbers of Twin City Business Firms Arranged and Classified

## CLIP WHAT YOU NEED

### INSTRUCTIONS HOW TO USE THE DIAL PHONES--

1. Remove receiver from hook and listen for "dial tone," which is represented by a steady hum. The dial tone indicates your line is clear and ready for dialing, and if tone is received, proceed to dial desired number.
2. If, after having dialed a number you hear an intermittent buzzing sound, it is what is called "busy tone," and indicates that the telephone you have dialed is in use or busy.
3. If you wish to make several calls, hold your receiver hook down for about five seconds after each call and before dialing again. This will give all switches time to release. The receiver hook should, of course, be released each time before dialing.
