Lone Xmas Jail Inmate Released for Day Does Not Return

Patterson Banks, colored, of Northampton County, entered a plea of guilty to a charge of being drunk and disorderly before Magistrate R. L. Martin Friday and was fined \$5 and costs. It was the night before Christmas when Banks was arrested by W. A. Merritt, night policeman, and taken to the Roanoke Rapids jail. A number of Christmas articles he had at the time were removed to the local base with him. After the colored man had sufficiently recovered to carry on a conversation he was interviewed in the jail by Chief of Police Clifton Massey. Banks wanted to go home for Christmas. He was the only prisoner in jail. Chief Massey accepted a cash bond for his appearance in Magistrate's court and Banks was soon on his way home. When Magistrate R. L. Martin opened court on the day Banks' trial was scheduled the prisoner failed to make his appearance. Chief Massey officially notified Deputy Sheriff L. E. Keeter of the colored man's failure to attend court and the latter official went after him with the proper credentials. Banks was arrested and appeared in court here last Friday.

Bank At Littleton Fails To Open Doors Wednesday Morning

The Farmers and Merchants Bank of Littleton failed to open its doors Wednesday morning. Chief State Bank Examiner John Mitchell was notified the same day. On its call statement of September 24, the bank had a capital stock of \$25,000; total resources of \$169,213.72; total deposits of \$113,746 and loans and discounts of \$128,660.94. L. M. Johnson was president and William Alfred Thorne, cashier. Mr. Thorne is also county treasurer of Halifax County. It is understood the bank held about \$25,000 of county funds which was protected by bank receivables of about twice the amount of the deposit. The county is also protected by a bond signed by several citizens of the county, so the closing of the bank will have no effect on the county funds, it is said.

(Continued from page one) to set up and promote missionary cultivation. Two months each year are set aside for this work. Rev. S. A. Stewart, a missionary worker from Japan, gave an interesting talk on "The Contribution Christianity Has Made To Japan." Christianity, he said has created a new spiritual morale among the natives of that country, and has become a real factor in the life of the people. He said a great foundation is being laid for future work there. Rev. Stewart informed the church workers that 200,000 heathens have been won to Christianity. A campaign is now on to increase that number to 1,000,000. In China, he said there have been 430,000 converts. A campaign is being conducted there to increase the number to 900,000. Dr. B. A. Stanbury of Durham, spoke on "The Unified Program of the Southern Methodist Church." Dr. Stanbury is chairman of the Board of Christian Education, a newly created board, which grew out of the consolidation of the Board of Education.
