## DEATHS

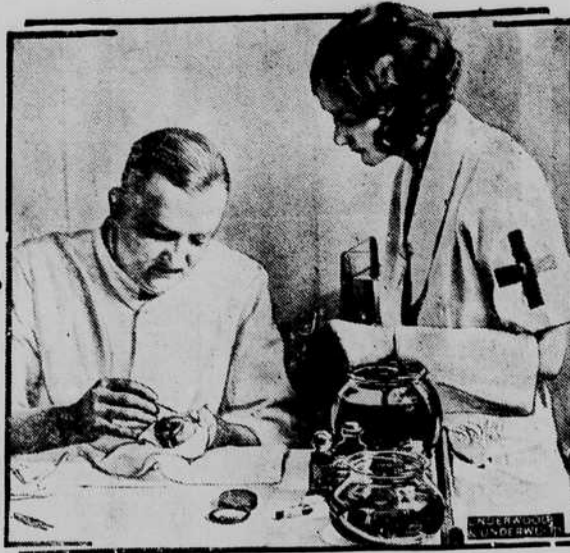
