In the other forward will be found Bie, former City League star of Portsmouth, and Sydney Weed, former ace of Cradock High School team of the County League. In the pivot position Captain Nig Lee will be found. Texas Slim as they call him in Tidewater prepped at Cradock High School, and for the last five years was high scorer of the Twin City basketball league, very shifty, rangy and an uncanny shot from the floor. Flanked in guard positions will see Bill Starkey, former star of football, baseball, and basketball at Maury High School, Norfolk, who was all state Virginia Scholastic guard during his high school days. His running mate, Norris Johnson played with the Orioles last year and this year is considered one of the best defensive men on the floor.
