

Lewis Wins Third Highest Prize In Coca-Cola Sales

Brooklyn — New York City — and Roanoke Rapids!

Those are the first three winning cities in one of four territories divided up over the entire United States in the 1932-33 Winter Sales Contest for Coca-Cola bottlers' salesmen, and it remained for K. Lewis, "live wire" salesman for the Weldon Coca-Cola Bottling Company to "bring home the bacon" and place the name of his plant third in the list of winning bottlers in his respective territory, comprised of the Eastern and Atlantic States.

In addition to the distinction of winning third in the "Class A" series of his territory, Mr. Lewis is richer by the sum of \$100.00 for his efforts, and he wishes to thank all of his friends and customers who helped him win the prize.

The nearest North Carolina approach to Mr. Lewis is Elizabeth City, ranking fifteenth in place on a list of twenty-nine winners.

This year's contest is similar to an annual drive launched by the Coca-Cola Co., for bottlers' salesmen, in which 243 cash prizes are offered.

Mr. Lewis is well-known and liked in the territory he serves. He is a resident of Weldon, but works exclusively in Roanoke Rapids territory. Daily his big yellow truck may be seen plying the "Avenue" and side streets. No customer is too big or too little for Lewis, and he gives all the same, pains-taking "service with a smile" that makes a contest winner. He is a member of the American Legion.
