

Amendment To Local School Bill

Gives Board Right To Fill Vacancies

(Special to THE HERALD)

Raleigh, April 27. — House Bill No. 1372, to authorize the commissioner of banks to pay over certain funds of the Scotland Neck Bank, held by him, for distribution to depositors of that bank, on which a hearing was held Tuesday, was reported into the House of Representatives favorably Wednesday and placed on the favorable calendar. Unless objections arise, the bill will probably be passed on its second reading Thursday.

Dr. Long's S. B. 596 to provide for the appointment of trustees of the Roanoke Rapids graded school district to fill vacancies by the board of trustees, to serve until the next regular election, when an unexpired term if filled by election by the qualified voters in the district, received in the House Thursday, after passage by the Senate, was referred to the House Education committee.

The bill is as follows:

"An Act to Amend Chapter Forty-two, Private Laws of Nineteen Hundred Thirty-One Relating to the Election of School Trustees for the Board of School Trustees of Roanoke Rapids by the Qualified Voters of the Roanoke Rapids Graded School District.

"The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

"Section 1: That Section four, Chapter Forty-two, Private Laws of Nineteen Hundred Thirty-One, be and the same is hereby repealed and the following enacted are substituted therefor:

"Section 4: All vacancies in said Board of Trustees caused by death, resignation, removal from the district or otherwise shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board, and the person so chosen shall serve until the next biennial general election for trustees of the Roanoke Rapids Graded School District when his successor shall be duly elected for the unexpired term."

The bill amending the Charter of Scotland Neck, providing for taxing various activities, already passed in both houses, was ratified and became the law Wednesday.

Sealed bids will be received by the Local Government Commission of North Carolina at its office in Raleigh, at 10:00 o'clock A. M., May 9th, 1933, for the purchase of \$150,000 Bonds, (being part of an authorized issue of \$365,000 Bonds) of the Roanoke Rapids Sanitary District, dated Jan. 1, 1932, maturing in the amount of \$2,000 on January 1, 1935, \$3,000 on January 1, 1936, \$2,000 on January 1, 1937, \$3,000 on January 1, 1938, \$2,000 on January 1 in each of the years 1939 to 1944, inclusive, \$5,000 on January 1 in each of the years 1945 to 1954, inclusive, \$6,000 on January 1, 1955, \$7,000 on January 1 in each of the years 1956 to 1959, inclusive, \$6,000 on January 1, 1960 and 1961, \$7,000 on January 1, 1962, \$6,000 on January 1, 1963 and 1964, \$4,000 on January 1, 1965, \$5,000 on January 1, 1966, \$4,000 on January 1, 1967, denomination \$1,000, interest payable January 1st and July 1st, both principal and interest payable in gold in New York City. Bidders will name the rate of interest the bonds will bear, not exceeding 6%. Bidders must present with their bids a certified check upon an incorporated bank or trust company payable unconditionally to the order of the State Treasurer for two percent of the face value of bonds bid for, to secure the district against any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid. The right to reject all bids is reserved. There will be no auction. Bonds registerable as to principal only. Opinion of Messrs. Storey, Thorndike, Palmer & Dodge, of Boston, will be furnished.
