## 22 Face Recorder Tuesday But Only Five For Liquor

### Busy Session At Recorder's Court Variety Of Cases

A variety of charges comprised the twenty-two cases tried in Recorder's Court Tuesday. Liquor charges led with five cases, while larceny was a close second with four cases. There were three cases of fornication and adultry, two cases each of sasault and assault with deadly weapon, driving while drunk and two charged with both assault with deadly weapon and carrying concealed weapon, and one case of affray and one of both driving while drunk and transporting liquor.

George Lee and Ned Little, charged with assault with deadly weapon and carrying concealed weapon, whose case was continued from last week, plead not guilty. They were found guilty, however, and sentenced to ninety days in jail to be assigned to work the roads.

W. F. Martin, Gray Outland, and Elizabeth Melvin, charged with fornication and adultry, and whose case was also continued from last week, plead guilty as to Martin, not guilty as to Outland. The judgment was six months in jail to be assigned to work the roads as to Martin. Capias to issue any time within two years after Friday, May 12, 1933.
