

## PURCHASES OF NEW AUTOMOBILES MAKES SUBSTANTIAL GAIN

Nearly Twice Amount Cars Sold In June This Year Over Last Year

### TRUCKS GAIN TOO

New automobiles sold in North Carolina in June reached 2376 and 490 trucks as compared with 1429 cars and 286 trucks in June 1932, and 2160 cars and 513 trucks in May of this year, Leland Harris, Motor Vehicle Bureau chief, reports.

Total new automobiles sold so far this calendar year number 9626 and 2000 trucks, as compared with 7106 cars and 1736 trucks in the first six months of last year. This increase of 2520 cars and 264 trucks in six months is looked upon as a remarkable come-back in new motor vehicle sales in six months.

Chevrolet led last month with 1040, Fords 472, Plymouths 370 and Pontiacs 124. Only one each of four big cars were sold, Franklin, LaSalle, Lincoln and Pierce-Arrow. Four Cadillacs and five Packards and Auburns, but 36 little Austins found purchasers.

#### NOTICE OF ELECTION AND NEW REGISTRATION

Notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in the Roanoke Rapids City Administrative Unit (Roanoke Rapids Graded School District) in Halifax County, North Carolina, on the 15th day of August, 1933, between the hours of sunrise and sunset, to ascertain whether there shall be levied in said unit a local annual tax not to exceed 50c on the \$100.00 valuation of all property, real and personal to supplement the funds provided by state budget allotments for the state supported public school eight months term and in addition thereto to provide funds for conducting a ninth month of school (a total term of not more than 180 days) in said Roanoke Rapids City Administrative Unit. The boundaries of said unit, which are the same as those of the Roanoke Rapids Graded School District are as follows:

All territory lying within the corporate limits of the town of Roanoke Rapids, and all of the portion of Halifax County not embraced within said corporate limits, but lying contiguous thereto within the following boundaries, to-wit: Beginning at a point on Roanoke River, being the dividing line between the farms of the estate of M. A. Hamilton, deceased, and the late B. W. Bass tract; thence south to the canal of the Roanoke Navigation and Water Power Company; thence down the canal to Medlin and Fulghum's line; thence a straight line to the Weldon and Gaston County road; thence west along said county road to Tilgham's Cross Roads; thence along the southern fork of the county road to Chocoyote

Creek; thence up Chocoyote Creek as it meanders to the dividing line between J. G. Simmon's tract and John D. Shaw's line; thence along the western line of J. G. Simmon's tract to the northwestern corner of said tract on the canal bank of the Roanoke Navigation and Water Power Company; thence from this last named point due north to the banks of the Roanoke River; thence down said river as it meanders to the point beginning.

The polling place is Roanoke Rapids High School Building.

A new registration has been ordered in the said unit and the registration book will be open at 9 o'clock A. M., on the 15th day of July, 1933 to the 5th day of August, 1933 at sunset, inclusive, the latter being the second Saturday before the election. The registration book will be open for registration of voters on Saturdays during said registration at the Roanoke Rapids High School Building in said unit.

The Saturday before the election shall be Challenge Day.

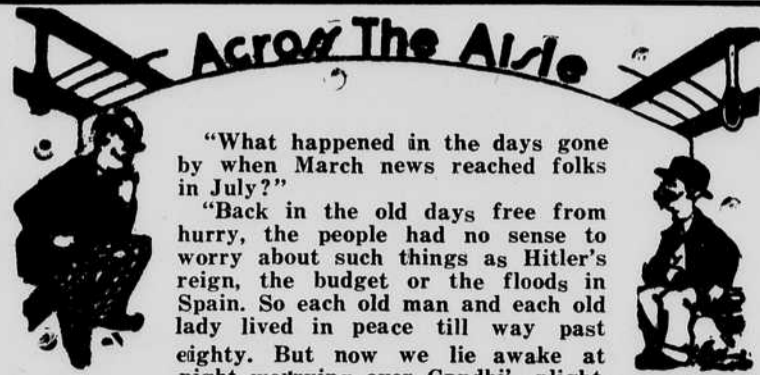
