Willie Jones, notorious Negro, better known as Bull Rider, is in jail at Halifax charged with the shooting and wounding of a 12 year old white girl, Mary Elizabeth Parker, at the home of Dock Piner in South Rosemary, Sunday night.

Officers reconstructing the case are finding it difficult to get a true story of what took place at the time of the actual shooting. The Negro came to the Piner place, just across the Chockoyotte
