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#### WIN 2 **MAJOR RACES**

Orderly Conduct At All City And County Polling Places At Saturday Primary

With quiet and orderly conduct characterizing the day, Halifax County voters marched to the polls 8,487 strong to cast the largest vote on record in the county last Saturday, June 2nd. The polls opened at 4:48 A. M., and closed at 7:42 P. M., with every voter in the County given the opportunity to cast his or her ballot.

Halifax County voters were to select their officers for seven county positions, as well as a State Senator, two House members, a Congressman and Utilities Commissioner.

Although feeling was tense, and the local issues important there was no trouble of any consequence throughout the day, either in the congested city precincts of Roanoke Rapids, or in the County. Local election officers fulfilled their duty to the letter, and are to be commended for the way in which they handled Saturday's vot-

Halifax County voters gave Julian Allsbrook a majority of 665 otes over his opponent. Senator T. W. M. Long, for the State Senate, and Leonidas Hux a majority of 1,223 votes over his opponent, Quentin Gregory, for Clerk of the Superior Court. Obviously more interest was felt in these two races than any others, although some of the candidates for the Board of County Commissioners were hotly contested.

Thorne and Leggett won a seat in the House over their oppor nts, Shields and Atkinson. The following five men were elected C unty Commissioners: Wrenn, War en, Collier, Whitaker and Perry, piling up safe majorities over four other Dickens a comparatively margin over Congressman Kerr, and Winborne was an easy winner oner.
