WELDON POLICE CLAMP DOWN ON TRAFFIC LAWS

Cops Stop Motorists Tuesday As Drive Is Launched To Enforce Speed Limit

That outsiders, as well as Weldon motorists must be impressed that the traffic laws are to be obeyed, was demonstrated here Tuesday, when many motorists were stopped by Weldon policemen. It seems that members of the Weldon police department have been instructed to clamp down on traffic law violators, and scores of cars have been stopped within the last few days and given a first "friendly" warning. If this warning is not heeded, obviously more drastic steps will have to be taken.

Although the city traffic laws have not been rigidly enforced in the past, particularly with regard to exceeding the speed limit, an increased impetus will be put on their enforcement in the future, the policemen say.

The city speed limit law is for the protection of both the pedestrian and the motorist, and it is for that reason that motorists should pay particular attention to it.
