session of the City Board of Commissioners tonight, the s.te for the proposed municipal building was selected and authorization was given for a loan of \$10,000 in order to complete storm sewers and assure the immediate widen_ ing of Roanoke Avenue in the business areas.

The municipal building will be located next to the corner location selected by the Federal government at 7th Street for the new postoff.ce building. The Commissioners authorized the purchase of most of the vacant property in that block which was not purchased by the Federal government.

In order to assure the widening of Roanoke Avenue from curb to curb in the bus ness sections, the Board ordered a loan of \$10,000 to purchase concrete p.pe and finance the installation of storm sewers at once.

As stated in another story in this issue, the contractor is ready to begin on the street contract after Christmas. A committe, headed by the Mayor, is endeavoring to get FERA aid on the storm sewer project to cut down the cost as much as possible.
