Officers are seeking Paul Spencer, serving a 15 year term for 2nd degree murder, and Henry Lowder, in for 7 years for store breaking.

Four of the six were recaptured and are in solitary at the Prison Farm. They ganged Guard Floyd Johnson and knocked him senseless with an iron bar.

City Health Officer, Dr. Martin, Tells Club Of Infantile Paralysis

One case of infantile paralysis, now in mild epidemic form in the State, is suspected at Garysburg where physicians are closely watching a young child who shows every symptom of having the dreaded disease.

No cases are yet known of in Halifax County, according to Health Officer Dr. Mc-Geachy, altho a total of 82 cases have been reported in the Eastern part of the State.
