

16 FACE JUDGE AT RECORDER'S COURT

Recorder Court Docket consisted of sixteen cases this week.

John Peoples, charged with assault, pleaded guilty. He was sentenced to five months in jail to work under the direction of the State Highway and Public Works Commission.

Clifton Tart, charged with reckless driving, was called and failed. Judgment absolute on bond. Capias and continued.

Ananias Jones, charged with larceny, pleaded not guilty. He was found guilty and sentenced to four months in jail.

W. E. Edwards, charged with driving while drunk, reckless driving, and assault, pleaded not guilty on all counts. He was found guilty of reckless driving and assault. Prayer for judgment was continued on condition he pays a fine of \$25.00 and costs. License to drive revoked for five months.

Edward Walker, charged with liquor and driving while drunk, pleaded guilty of unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor. Prayer for judgment continued on payment of costs.

George Jacobs, charged with assault, pleaded not guilty. He was found guilty and sentenced to three months in jail to work under the direction of the State Highway and Public Works Commission.

Elmore Bennett pleaded not guilty to assault on female with deadly weapon. He was found guilty and prayer for judgment was continued on condition defendant pays costs and fine of \$15.00 and remains of good behavior for two years.

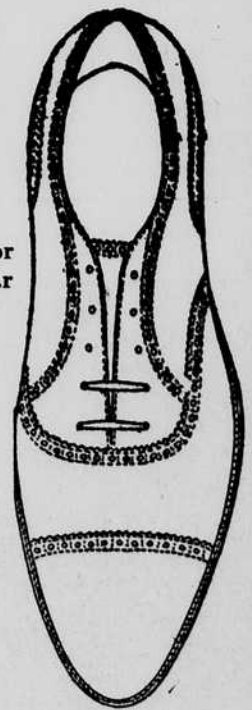
