Monday, October 14th, is the date set by the Roanoke Rapids Merchants Association to begin the Greater Roanoke Rapids Trade Days which will last for a month.

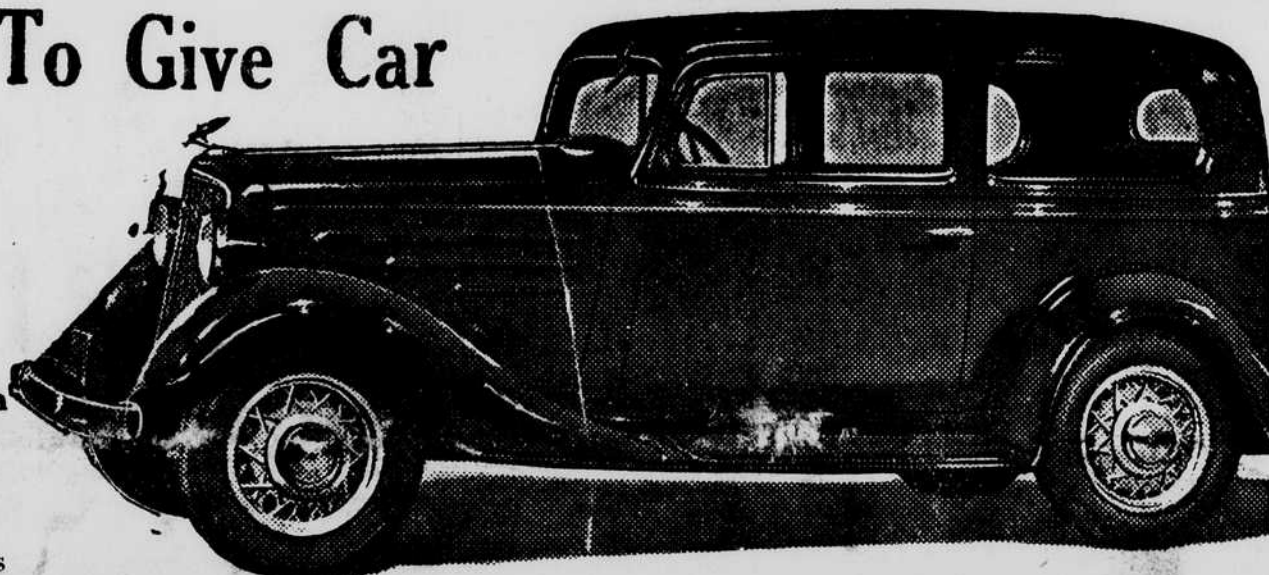

### NEWSOME BETTER

Elton Outland of  
Woodland Seriously  
Injured; May Not  
Recover

### FUNERAL TOMORROW

The body of Cecil M. Stevenson arrived here from Fremont, Ohio, at 11 o'clock tonight and was taken to the residence in Jackson where the funeral will be held Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Jackson Baptist Church.

Cecil M. Stevenson of Jackson was instantly killed, Elton Outland, of Woodland was seriously injured and Major C. Newsome of Roanoke Rapids suffered a broken jaw in an automobile accident near Fremont, Ohio, Tuesday night. The three men were on their way to Detroit for the World Series.

The two injured men were brought to a hospital in Fremont where it was found Outland was suffering from a fractured skull and may die. His condition was described today as very serious.

Major Newsome had a broken jaw and was bruised but suffered no internal injuries. Mrs. Newsome, who left Roanoke Rapids early Wednesday morning with M. C. Newsome Jr., Mrs. Outland, and Outland's sister, Mrs. Brown of Woodland, phoned relatives at 4 a.m. this morning that Mr. Newsome was resting comfortably and would recover from his injuries.
