Also included is a project to widen Roanoke Avenue from curb to curb between Third and Ninth Sts. Another part of the project would pave Tenth Street as far as the railroad. All side streets from the Aver's to Hamilton and from the Jackson are included in deed paving.

The entire cost of the project will be about \$270,000 of which 45 per cent or \$121,500 would be a grant from the Federal government, the balance being split between the city and the adjacent property owners; the city paying \$74,000 and the property owners a like amount.

The city would finance with a 30 year bond issue, the property owners being given ten years to pay their assessments. If approved by Raleigh PWA officials, the project goes to Washington for approval there.

Ditch Approved

The Mayor was notified today that the PWA project for piping and filling in the ditch on Roanoke Avenue between 11th and 14th had been approved by Raleigh and the papers are now in Washington for final approval. Good news on this is expected next week.
