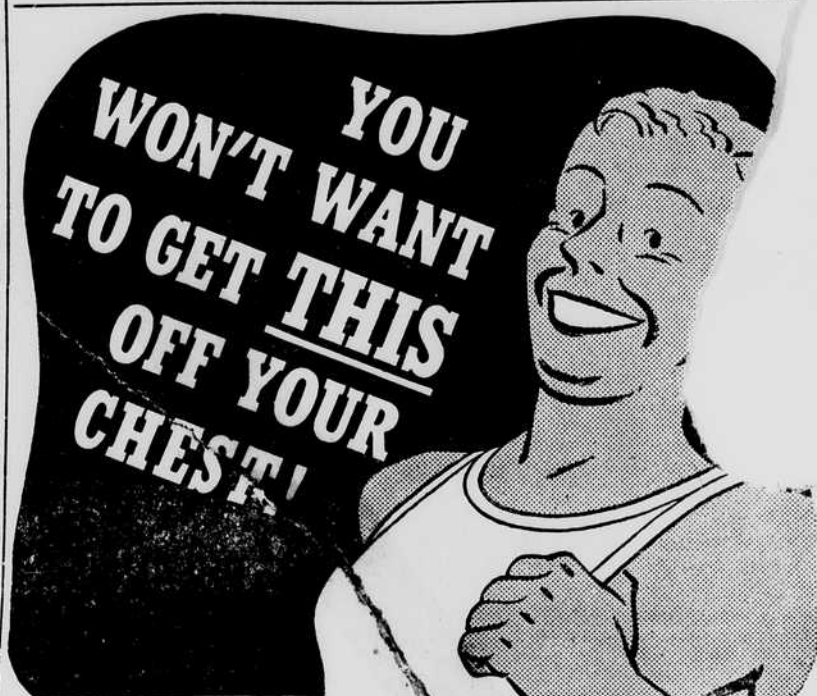
Mr. Shearin, a local boy, is Project Superintendent of the camp. His article will appear in the next issue of The Herald.—Ed.
