### CITY BOARD **IN AUGUST** MEETING

The City Board of Commissioners of Roanoke Rapids met in regular monthly meeting Tuesday, August 3rd and ordered the school election for the Roanoke Rapids Graded School District set for Tuesday, October 5th.

At this time, three school trustees will be elected. The registration books will open for new voters ,not registered, on Sept. 17th and will remain open thru Saturday, Sept. 25th. The books will be at the High School building from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day. The City Board appointed P. A. Reid as registrar.

A \$6,000 tax anticipation note was authorized by the Board to be approved by the Local Government Commission.

Tax Collector A. E. Akers was authorized to advertise delinquent taxpayers' property on September 13th.

An appropriation for WPA playground supervision for the city was ordered raised from \$180 to \$300.
