## COMING TO COUNTY



Governor Clyde Hoey will come to Halifax County next week when he speaks Thursday afternoon at the annual Cotton & Peanut Festival at Enfield which starts Monday and lasts all next week.

The Festival is being promoted by the Enfield Lions Club and promises to be an annual affair.

It is understood that a new grocery store will occupy the place now used by the Dr. Pepper Co., but no details could be learned today.
