

THOSE of you, who like us, have trouble convincing people about the population of Roanoke Rapids may feel free to clip this picture of one of the official signs of the North Carolina State Highway Department at the city limits of Roanoke Rapids. This picture was taken last week by the staff photographer of The Herald and is of the sign at the Chockoyotte Creek city line on South Rosemary street. Confusion to outsiders comes from the fact they still read the 1930 census figures (8 years old) and taken before the combination of the old Roanoke Rapids and Rosemary in 1931.
