Bill Allsbrook On Stage Wednesday

For all around entertainment and family night at the movies, "Out West with the Hardys," which will open Sunday at the New Peoples for a three day run, should not be missed.

It brings new laurels to the favorites millions of motion picture fans have come to know and to love, Lewis Stone as the Judge, Mickey Rooney as Andy, Cecilia Parker as Marian, Fay Holden as Mrs. Hardy, Sara Haden as Aunt Milly, Ann Rutherford as Andy's "steady" girl friend, Polly, and Don Castle as Dennis Hunt, Marian's Carvel boy friend.

Given an adventurous background of modern ranch life, the Hardys go-to-town when they are invited to the ranch of Dora and Bill Northcote. Dora was a former sweetheart of the Judge, who has read that he is an expert on water rights and asks him to aid her in a battle over a river that is essential to her ranch. Andy immediately clashes with Jake, who proves that she is a better "man" than Andy by out-riding him, out-shooting and out-roping him. Marian falls in love with the handsome ranch foreman, Ray Holt. The Judge succeeds in ironing out these difficulties but fails to settle the water rights tangle until Mrs. Hardy comes to his rescue. It all ends gayly and happily.

The gay tale of a madcap heiress who chucks her fortune and her yacht to work in a bargain basement and eat hamburgers with a roving reporter will be brought to the screen of the Peoples Theatre Wednesday-Thursday when Virginia Bruce and Fredric March will be shown in "There Goes My Heart."

The story opens with Joan Butterfield (Virginia Bruce), the "richest girl in the world," decamping with her grandfather's yacht and cutting loose to New York, freedom and adventure bound.

Penniless and incognito, she strikes up an acquaintance with Patsy Kelly, who demonstrates electric vibrators in the basement of Joan's own Grandfather Butter-

field's department store. Among Patsy's assets is a boy friend named Pennypacker E. Pennypacker, (the inimitable Alan Mowbray), who works as a motorman by night and studies chiropractic by day.

Patsy takes Joan into the one-room walkup she shares with Dorothy, (Nancy Carroll), a snooty salesgirl in the store, who takes an instant dislike to Joan. Patsy also gets Joan a job selling fireless cookers in the basement of Butterfield's.

Meanwhile, a reporter named Bill Spencer (Fredric March) has been trying to get an interview with Joan. He had caught a glimpse of her leaving her yacht, from which he, in turn, had been unceremoniously tossed into the Pacific.

Furious over this sort of treatment, he decides to write a story contrasting Joan's life of ease with the hard lives of the girls who work in her grandfather's store.

Roving the bargain basement for material, he is amazed to recognize Joan behind a counter. Pretending to believe her just another salesgirl, he takes her out to dinner, but his hatred turns to love and the pair are soon having a grand time, riding the subways, eating hot corn and sweet potatoes at sidewalk stands and winning contests at ice-skating rinks.

Bill tears up the story about Joan. When Joan's furious grandfather locates her through Patsy's jealous

roommate, Bill spirits her away to a lonely retreat known as Sandy Island, where Joan learns to cook his favorite dishes and the pair are idyllically happy.

Meanwhile, however, Bill's editor has patched together the story Bill wrote about Joan and published it. Crushed by what looks like Bill's duplicity, Joan welcomes her grandfather and gratefully returns home with him.

The way in which Bill finally wins Joan will prove to be interesting to all patrons.

Bob Hope will stir up things again at the New Peoples Friday-Saturday when the new romantic

comedy, "Thanks For The Memory," will be presented.

The comedy casts Bob in the role of a young husband who is struggling against several problems. He has a job which doesn't pay too well as an electric appliance salesman. Then his wife—played by lovely Shirley Ross—decides that Bob should give up his job and let her go back to work as a model, the purpose being more time for Bob to write.
