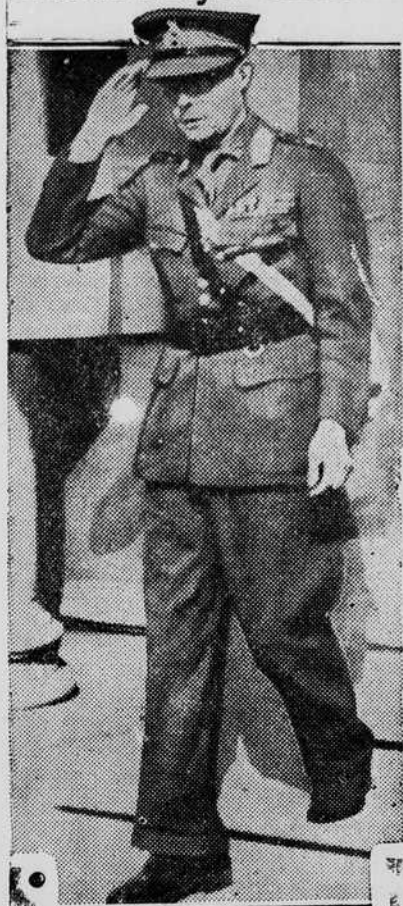


British Major General

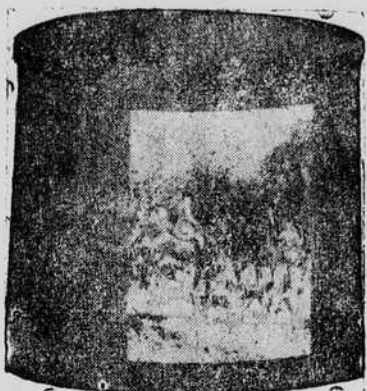
