Clinic For Northampton Co. Children

About 115 pupils from the schools of Northampton County were X-rayed for tuberculosis at the Roanoke Rapids Hospital Wednesday of this week. Reports on the pictures will be in the hands of the Northampton County Health Department in about three weeks, it is said.

The children were brought to the hospital as a result of tuberculin tests given last November, the children receiving positive reactions being examined further for the disease.

Wednesday of this week was set for the colored children of Northampton, but the snow necessitated a postponement of plans.

The clinic was in charge of Dr. Parker, Northampton County health officer. He was assisted by technicians from the state sanatorium, Harold Satterthwaite and Harry Timberlake, the latter formerly of Northampton County. County nurses, Misses Idell Buchan and Hilda Caviness, assisted in the clinic also.

In an interview Miss Buchan said that 115 positive reactions among the total number of children in the schools of the county is about an average percentage. She said that no one is able to predict the number that will have tuberculosis out of a group of children who react to the tuberculin tests.

LAND BROS. FIRE IN VIRGINIA

Land Brothers, who operate a jewelry store in this city and Emporia, Virginia, suffered considerable loss because of a fire at their third store in Front Royal, Virginia, early Monday morning.

The blaze was said to be attributed to fumes collecting in a boiler of the furnace in the building they occupy in the Virginia town. The fire started about two o'clock Monday morning. Estimated loss will not exceed \$1,000, according to Wyche Land, junior partner of the firm and manager of the city store. The most valuable stock carried by the store was locked up in a fireproof safe, it is said.

Land Brothers established their Front Royal, Virginia, store about two years ago. It is managed by S. E. Rainey, who formerly worked for the company in Emporia and Roanoke Rapids. The store is again doing business as usual, after replenishing their stock and repairing damage done to fixtures, young Land said today.
