## $94.3 \%$ Of Census For 1930 Listed In Second Distric $\dagger$

6 census enumerators in Roanok Rapids have turned in 7457 names for the city at this time, according to information received here today sional District. Two more enumerafrom A. M. Atkinson, Census supervisor of the Second Congrestors are still working in their districts within the city and have not yet turned in their lists of names. An average of 1236 names have been turned in from the six completaled 1739, while the lowest showed only 764 . There is a possibility that the two enumerators who have yet to make their reports will have larger totals than any of those turned in, in that their work is requiring a greater lengthof time. Mr. Atkinson said that he believed that a complete report on the city would be available by the next issue of the paper.
The supervisor stated that his 35th daily report showed that 94.3 per cent of the population in 1930 had been enumerated at this time. The 1930 census showed the Second District had a population of 276,795 . At the present 261,196 have been enumerated.
