Traffic **Ordinance**

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF ROANOKE RAPIDS that it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to park a truck exceeding twenty (190) feet in length on any of the (20) feet in length on any of the following streets, except in areas designated, marked and lettered on said streets by the Police Depart-

That it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to park a motor vehicle for a longer period than two and one-half (2½) hours from 8:00 A.M. to 6:00 P.M., except-ing Sundays, on the following streets: ROANOKE AVENUE between

Ninth and Eleventh Streets TENTH STREET between Ham-

ilton and Madison Streets

ELEVENTH STREET between Hamilton and Jackson Streets
Any person violating this ordinance shall, upon conviction, be fined \$10.00 for each and every of-
