
Two Men Are **Held In Jail** On Charges

The life of Blanche Walston, 11-year-old school girl, was snuffed out yesterday when she died of injuries received when hit by an automobile operated by a drunken driver, and it was the second tragedy striking the family of Mr. and Mrs. M. T. Walston of Scotland Neck in two days.

CITY IS SEEKING **PROJECT**

Underpass At Junction Considered

The city board of commissioners in regular session Tuesday afternoon took the first step to eliminate hazards at the Junction railroad crossing by authorizing Masslich and Mitchell, bond attorneys, to handle an election and issuance of bonds necessary to raise city funds for building an underpass at the crossing.

A special fund is maintained by the Federal government for the elimination of grade crossings, and the work is done by the State with cities and towns furnishing the right of way and damages.

It has been estimated by Highway Department engineers, who damages for an underpass at the Junction will not exceed \$16,000. Highway Commissioner Carroll L. Wilson of the First Division states that the project will cost approximately \$150,000, and the federal government will supplement the \$16,000 furnished by the city.

Elimination of the Junction crossing has been considered here for several years, and the project is not yet certain. The crossing is considered one of the most dangerous spots for motorists in this section, and since an underpass is considered necessary to remedy the situation the matter will be decided by Roanoke Rapids citizens in a special referendum on the issuance of \$16,000 worth of bonds.

No date for the referendum has been set, as the matter has just been authorized by the city board and put into the hands of the bond attorneys.

At the same time, it is believed, the citizens of Roanoke Rapids will also be asked to vote on the issuance of bonds totaling \$12,000 for the city cemetery project. The board of commissioners has approved the purchase of a number of acres from the T. Lee Whitaker estate for a cemetery, and funds must be raised for buying the land

'No Orders' To **Curtail Power** Here By Vepco

There may be "no blackouts' for Roanoke Rapids-no curtailment of power used by the local textile mills and other industries here or in any of the other 14 counties in Northeastern North Carolina served by the Virginia Electric & Power Company, according to an official statement made at press-time by J. T. Chase, Vice-President of the company in charge of operations in North Carolina.

Mr. Chase stated that, "Up to this time, no order has been issued by OPM or any other regulatory body or governmental agency to the Virginia Electric & Power Company in general, or their North Carolina division, whereby any curtailment of illumination or power should be enforced."

"We've got the power," Mr. Chase continued, "our steam plants are operating and we are not dependent upon water power." The North Carolina division of Vepco serves Halifax, Gates, Chowan, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Currituck, Dare, Edgecombe, Bertie, Washington, Martin, Northampton, Hertford and Tyrell counties.
