

# REGISTRARS NAMED TO ASSIST WITH 3rd DRAFT MONDAY

## Volunteers Will Meet On Friday For Instructions

W. O. Thompson has been named Chief Registrar to supervise the registration of all men in the Roanoke Rapids area between the ages of 20 and 45, T. W. Mullen, chairman of local board No. 1, announced this week. The registration will be held throughout the nation on February 16.

Mr. Thompson will work directly through the local board and will supervise the work of more than sixty registrars and workers who will assist in the registration here on Monday of next week, according to Mr. Mullen.

In the meantime all of the appointed registrars will meet in the court room of the municipal building here on Friday night at 7:30 to receive their instructions for conducting the registration from members of the local board. Similar meetings will be held over the week-end for registrars who are to work at the remaining two places of registration, it was stated.

In Roanoke Rapids township the registration will be held at the new Armory building in the city. In Weldon township, the registration will be held at the community building, and in Faucette's township and that part of Littleton which is in Halifax county, the registration will be held in Kenyon's old store, Littleton.

Men between the ages of 20 and 45 will register. If a man has reached his 20th birthday on or before December 31, 1941, it is required to register, and those who have not reached their 45th birthday before the registration date, February 16, are also required to sign their names on the dotted line.

## War On Stray Dogs Starts In City Monday

Chief of Police H. E. Dobbins stated yesterday that because of the rabies epidemic in Halifax county it would be positively necessary that all dog owners in the city of Roanoke Rapids to confine their dogs to their premises for a 30 day period, unless the dog wears a collar containing a tag showing it has been inoculated against rabies within the last twelve

months.

Dobbins made the announcement on orders from Mayor Kelly Jenkins and the city council, which is showing concern over the fact that the town of Littleton, just west of here, is now under quarantine as a result of three dogs going mad there during the past week. One child was badly bitten by one of the rabid dogs and is now undergoing Pasteur treatment.

The police chief stated that Roanoke Rapids was cooperating in every way with the county health department in eliminating any menace that may be confronting the city and county.

"Any dogs that are found running at large after noon Monday, February 16, and not wearing a tag showing that such dog has been inoculated against rabies in the past 12 months will be travelling at his own risk," Dobbins said.

All police officers have been instructed to be on the watch for stray dogs and those which do not carry an anti-rabies tag on their collar will be destroyed.
