The new Roanoke Rapids Armory building, constructed since the departure for camp of the local National Guard unit, will be inhabited in the near future by some 100 or more soldiers comprising Company D, 30th Engineer Battalion who are expected to arrive in the city about the middle of this month and barrack here for an indefinite stay.

The unit, whose headquarters is at Fort Belvoir, Va., will be com-manded by First Lieut. A. T. Dodson, Jr. The company has been stationed in Wilson, with other units of the 30th Engineers, during which time it has done topographical work for the Army in areas throughout Eastern Carolina.


