Civil Service **Exams Will Be** Given In Area

The Civil Service Commission is seeking Junior Chemists and Senior Bookkeeping Machine Operators for the Federal Service.

For Senior Bookkeeping Machine Operators positions, a written test to determine ability to perform various kinds of clerical work will be given. The salary is \$1,620 a year. At least one year of paid experience is required in the operation of a typewriter-general accounting machine. Applicants must be over 18 years of age. Applications must be filed with the Civil Service Commission not later than May 19, 1942.

For the position of Junior Chemwith 30 semester hours in chemis-4 months of the date of the applying. There is no written test. Applications must be filed with the Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., and will be accepted until the needs of the service have been met.
