BLACKOUT IN ENFIELD IS A BIG SUCCESS

Enfield's part in the Blackout of the Tarboro District on Friday night was declared a pronounced success by R. B. Davis, local chairman of Civilian Defense. Within a few minutes after the blackout signal Enfield was in total darkness and remained so for forty-five minutes. Only lights during the period was on the Champion train, and gates, as it passed through town.

Highway patrolmen on duty on highway 301 stopped traffic going north and south during the time. Air Raid wardens, auxiliary police and auxiliary firemen, worked with the regular police and fire departments in perfect cooperation to bring about the success of this, Enfield's first blackout test.

During the blackout period the fire department made five separate hose connections at as many different hydrants without an illumination.

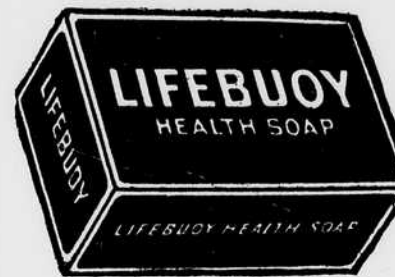

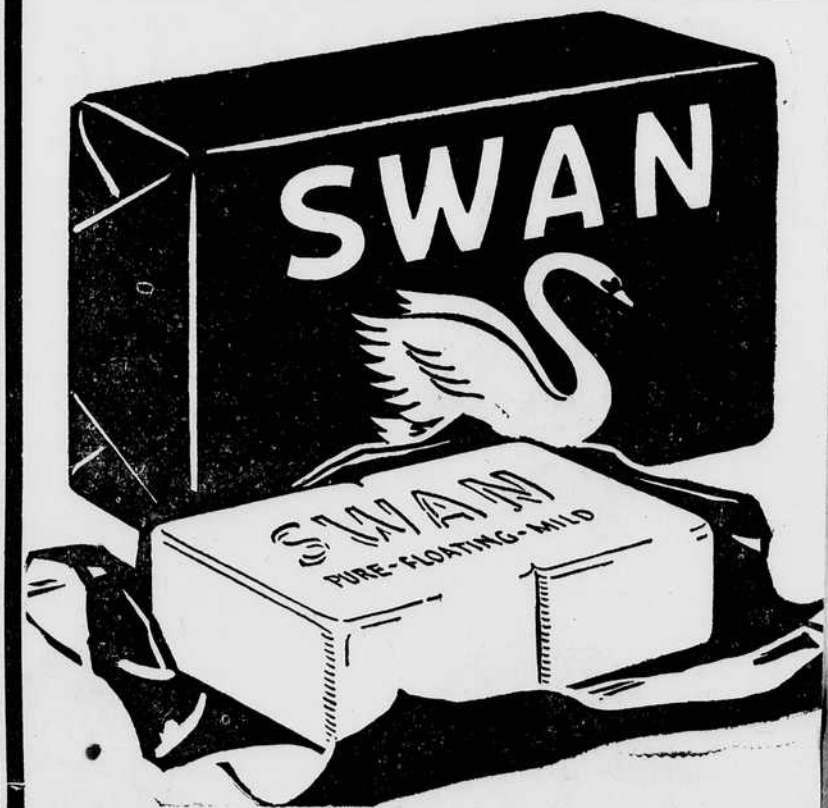
