NEW MANAGER BY A. L. HUX

Will Fill Unexpired Term of Warren; Takes Office

D. G. Dickens of Littleton, was this afternoon appointed a member of the Board of County Commissioners to fill the unexpired term of N. W. Warren, chairman of the Board, who died in a Durham hospital Wednesday of last week.

The appointment was made by A. Leonidas Hux, Clerk of the Superior Court, who in making the appointment stated he felt that Mr. Dickens was well qualified, and would render a high type of service to the county.

Mr. Dickens took the oath of office immediately, pleading earnesly to perform his duties and that he would at all times keep foremost the interest of Halifax County. He is a life-long resident of the county, and is a successful business man. A veteran of World War 1, he saw service overseas duty in the Argonne Forest.

He was a candidate for the county board during the last campaign, which is the only time he blic office.

The next regular meeting of the County Board of Commissioners is scheduled for next Monday, at which time board members are expected to pick a successor for the chairmanship left vacant by the death of Mr. Warren last week.
