



Inland distribution of fresh seafood will continue to expand as a result of the company's successful experimentation with equipment for freezing these products and shipping them safely over long routes. Another phase of modern merchandising to be extended involves the movement of dairy foods from natural production areas to all parts of the nation. An increasingly broadened did will thus become available to more consumers, Mr. Bealer said.

While A&P now does business with farmers in every important agricultural zone in the United States, the company continues to spur the future farmer by offering scholarships or farm equipment to boys and girls who top the entries each year in the National Junior Vegetable Growers Association competition in production and ministering of farm produce.
