Robbers Of Service Station Plead Guilty Monday; Given Sentences In State's Prison

George William Moore, 24; Raymond Mark Zalewski, 22, and Joseph Lo Guedice, 17, all white men, pleaded guilty last Monday in Halifax County Superior Court to charges of robbery with firearms. Judge R. Hunt Parker of Roanoke Being Agitated Rapids, presiding jurist, sentenced all three of the men to "not less than five years and not more than 10 years" at hard labor in State's cison.

The case is the outgrowth of the holding up of Pepper's Service Station about 12:15 Monday night, Nov. 19, and the locking of Ed Glover, employe of the station, in the rest room. The robbers then rifled the cash register, taking \$55.75. Jumping into a grey-green Buick master coach, the trio fled the city and were captured about an hour later as they neared the ty limits of Emporia, Va.

Moore is believed to be from Marlow, Okla.; Zalewski is thought to be from Portland, Conn., and Guedice from Middletown, Conn.

Another case disposed of was that of Robert Jones, white, of Scotland Neck, who was charged with kidnapping and assault with a deadly weapon on Berry Smith and Lorenzo Covington, negroes. e was sentenced on the two assault counts to six months on the roads and fined \$150 and court costs in each case. The road sentences were suspended and Jones placed on probation.

A 15-year-old negro boy, Arthur Sessoms, who has a long criminal record, and is said to be a six times escapee from the Morris Training School, pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking and entering field. Judge Parker sent the negro to the roads for one year.
