Pfc. H. Charles Leatherwood, Jr., who was killed in action in Meschede, Germany, on 13 April, 1945, has been awarded the Silver Star Medal posthumously for gallantry in action near Frnkfurt, Germany, on March 27, 1945, according to a letter received from the Adjutant General. The letter is as follows:

"I have the honor to inform you that, by direction of the President, the Silver Star has been posthumously awarded to your son, Pfc. Hilliard Charles Leatherwood, Jr., Field Artillery. The citation is as follows:

For gallantry in action on 27 March, 1945, in Frankfurt-on-main, Germany, when enemy artillery shelled the area in which his section was operating, Pfc.
