### Negro Is Scheduled To Die On April 5th

Thomas Hart, Halifax County negro, is scheduled to die in the gas chamber at State's Prison, Raleigh, Friday, April 5. The State Supreme Court handed down a decision last week upholding Halitax County Superior Court in the conviction of Hart of first degree murder.

The negro was found guilty last fall for the murder of Marjorie Blackwood, Negro, and the seconddegree murder of her brother, Al Preston Blackwood, on the Thomas Myrick farm near Littleton last August 1. The murders followed a quarrel Hart had with Marjorie.
