

"In view of the fact that epidemics of poliomyelitis are now known to exist in Florida and Texas, states from which visitors frequently travel to North Carolina resort areas, the following regulation is hereby adopted as an emergency measure to prevent, in so far as possible ,the spread of this disease from the epidemic areas:

"All persons under sixteen (16) years of age who come into this state from a poliomyelitis epidemic 4th District area shall be quarantined on their "Ali camps where children have
