BOSTON (U.P.)—An \$89,000 gift by U. S. Senator Leverett Saltonstall was among the total of \$6,371,800 donated to Harvard University during the past year.

Saltonstall's gift, setting up a fund in memory of his son, Peter Brooks Saltonstall, who was killed on Guam, will be used to provide Harvard scholarships for students from the far Pacific. It also will finance research designed to raise living standards in the Hawaiian Islands, Australia and New Zealand.
