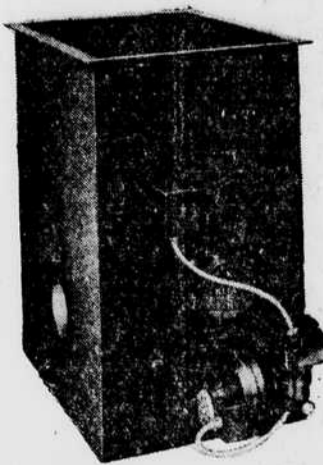
BPW Club Holds Picnic Meeting
