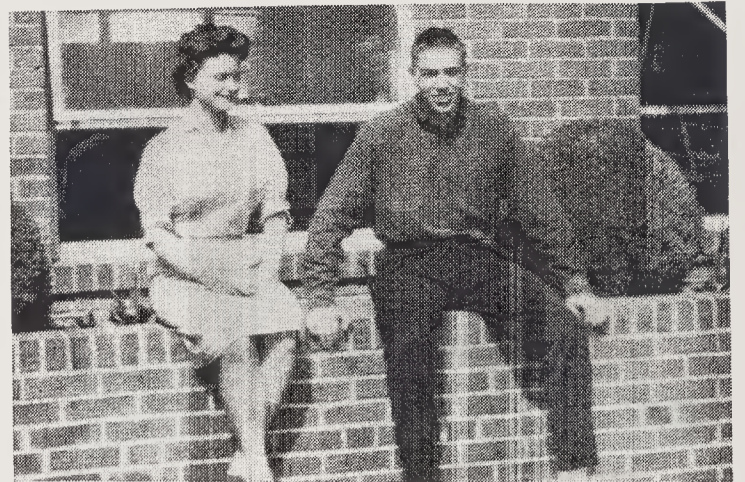

Donnie would also not trade places with anyone, as he, too is content with his present identity. He would visit a small South Sea Island so he could get away from it all.

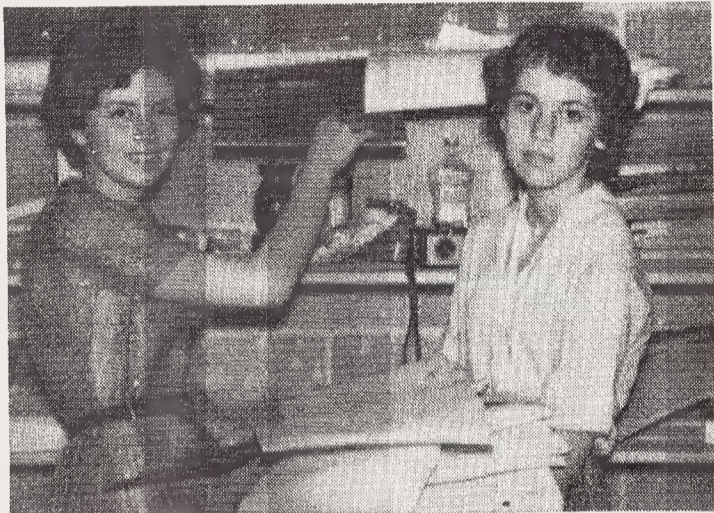
Donnie considers our greatest need to be glass backboards, also.

Mr. L.S.H.S.'s secret ambition is to design boats in Florida, and his future plans include going to Wake Forest College and studying business administration and law.

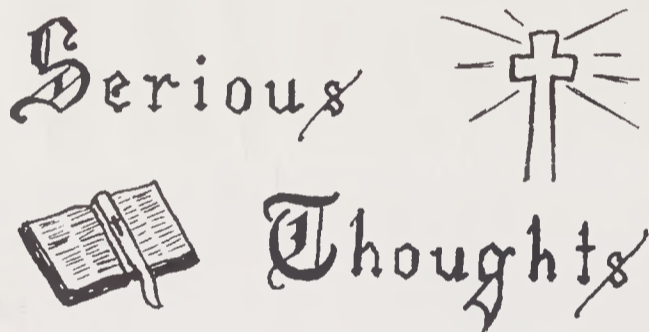
Donnie's most embarrassing moment was when he accidentally kicked the trash basket across Mrs. Berry's room.
