

GREAT RIVALS WILL MEET ON SATURDAY AT CALDWELL GYM

Winston-Salem to Battle With G. H. S. in Basketball in First Game

LARGE CROWD EXPECTED

Line-up Not Yet Announced—Sockwell, Wyrick, Taylor, Sampson, and Gardner Are Expected to Play

Greensboro sport fans and those of the surrounding vicinity will get a rare taste of the indoor sport Saturday night, January 15, when the cage teams of Greensboro and Winston-Salem High will lock horns on the Caldwell court.

While little is known of the strength of the Winston outfit it has long been the custom for the "Black and Gold" to be represented by a scrappy outfit and Saturday's encounter should prove no exception. The fact that Winston received two grid setbacks at the hands of Greensboro during the past season should prove any extra inducement necessary to spar them on.

As for the G. H. S. outfit, sport fans of the state are well aware of the kind of team that she turns out and they may rest assured that when the opening whistle sounds Saturday night she will have five men in there who will do everything in their power to make the night end in a typical Greensboro victory. The "Purple and Gold" rookie squad, headed by the veterans, Taylor and Wyrick, are just at present striking their real form and this encounter should find them in rare condition to do battle.

Although no line-up has been announced, it is a safe bet to say that tomorrow's starting line-up will probably find Sockwell and Wyrick at the forward positions, Taylor at center and Sampson and Gardner at guard. Others who will no doubt see action are Norman, Caviness, and Tackett.

G. A. A. POINT SYSTEM

1. Citizenship, 15 (minimum).
2. Hiking, 50 miles (minimum).
3. Participation in at least two sports and not more than 200 points in any one sport.
4. Swimming, 15 (minimum).
5. Training, 14 (minimum).
6. Correct posture, 5 points.
7. Remainder optional.

8. Passing grades on three-fourths of all subjects for the three months previous to awarding letter.

3. For each additional 100 points above 400, a star shall be awarded.

4. A girl may win points in the same sport or activity during successive seasons or years.

5. The required minimum games, practices and points shall be the same each year.

6. A star may be awarded for 300 points.

GROUP X—AWARDING OF HONORS

1. Honors shall be awarded by the Athletic Council and approved by the scholarship committee.

2. Citizenship shall be decided by the Athletic Council.

3. Each sport head shall approve points won in his sport before they are turned in to the secretary to be approved by the Athletic Council.

4. State monogram must be approved by Central Committee, where all records are kept.

5. Points are transferable between schools where records are kept.

6. No points won in camp or summer playground work may be credited toward any award.

WYATT TAYLOR

Wyatt is the only letter man back for this year's varsity. He has had two years' experience on the squad and in him Coach Park has an excellent man. Taylor is an unusual floor worker, an accurate passer, and cages the ball splendidly.

"PETE" WYRICK

"Pete" returns this year with one year's experience on the squad. Although he did not make his letter last season he saw plenty of action as forward and should be in condition to go great this year. "Pete" is low in stature but his great speed and ability to score far overshadow this minor point.

COLTRANE DESIRES TO SEE SCHOLARSHIP IN G. H. S. ATHLETICS

"People Will Some Day Realize Full Value of Sports," Says Coach

HE TALKS TO REPORTERS

Wants Clean, Honest Athletics in G. H. S. Suggests Reward to Graduates For High Ideals

In an interview, Thursday, January 5, Homer Coletrane, head of athletics at G. H. S., said, "I would like to see scholarship in athletics placed on equal basis with scholarship in school. In years to come the people will realize more, how much good athletics have done and how much good they will do."

"All the boys that went out for football worked harder during that period than any other time so they could pass two-thirds of their subjects and keep playing on the team. After the football season was over, some of the boys began to lag in their school work. The boys have nothing to make them work for."

"Some people have the idea that only rough-necks go out for athletics, but this is not true. We want to get rid of this notion."

"I would like to have suggestions from the student body on some plan to make the boys of G. H. S. work and reach the highest goal in athletics. If it would help, a reward might be given at each graduating class for the best athlete. This would be a great honor."

"What we want in G. H. S. is clean, honest athletics, and to get athletics on equal basis with scholarship. Boys, work for it."
