The Greensboro High School track team is entered in the Guilford College track meet to be held there Saturday, April 9, and the coaches are preparing to take the whole squad. The meet will be held in both the morning and afternoon, at ten o'clock and two o'clock.

Charlotte will not be entered this year, and Greensboro's chance for winning the meet are considered better than good.

The squad center around Theron Brown and Clarence Phoenix, Greensboro's two largest point-winners.

A letter from D. R. Haworth, dean of men at Guilford, to Mr. Phillips, states: "I hope that your boys and girls will support your team both with numbers and with spirit."

A large crowd of G. H. S. students is expected to turn out for the meet, Guilford being only six miles distant.

ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION ARRANGES SCHEDULES

Following is the official program and order of events for swimnings meets of District Five Girls' Athletic Association:

1. Relay: Four swimmers, each to swim one length of the pool.
2. Twenty yard breast stroke or two lengths of pool if less than 60 feet.
3. Twenty yard dash or one length of pool.
4. Back stroke—twenty yards or one length of pool.
5. Forty yard dash or two lengths of pool.
6. Fancy diving.
7. Sixty yard dash or three lengths of pool.
8. Medley relay: Back stroke, breast stroke and free style. Three swimmers—each swimming one style, in order named, one length of pool.
