When he came to Greensboro in September, 1940, Mr. Doty was engaged as supervisor of industrial arts at Lindley Junior high school. On February 6 he was transferred to Senior to take charge of diversified occupational work. He is a graduate of the Eastern Kentucky State Teacher's college.

Florance Praises Work

"The new coordinator's job is indeed a big one," Mrs. Florance commented when interviewed as to Mr. Doty's new position. "Though vocational work is relatively new to him, I am sure that by the initiative and interest he has shown thus far, Mr. Doty will add immensely to the department," she concluded.

While his work at Senior will occupy most of his time, Mr. Doty will expand his activities at Central Junior high school. There he will aid in the occupation program carried on in the commercial building.

When not employed at his other numerous duties the new faculty member will make a wide survey of the needs of young graduates in the business world.
