Phil Hudson To Coach At Senior Next Year

Phil Hudson, former coach at Tech high in Charlotte and star athlete at Appalachian State Teachers college, has been added to the Senior high coaching staff as first assistant to head Coach Bob Jamieson.

Hudson's coming to Senior high marks the fulfillment of a long-felt need for an addition to the athletic staff.

Honorably discharged from the army because of a ruptured ear drum, Hudson will begin his duties in the fall, assistant Coach Jamieson with the football drills.

While at Appalachian he won three letters, starring in football, basketball and baseball. Hudson has been at Charlotte Tech high for the past year.

Coach Jamieson has been at Senior high almost a decade and has been assisted the past two years by Buck Mann. The addition of Hudson to the staff does not affect the status of Coach Mann, but is designed to relieve Jamieson and Mann of some of their many duties in order to give more coaching to individual athletes.

Curtain Brought Down on Whirlie Baseball Season

The curtain has fallen on another baseball season for Senior high's Purple Whirlwind. The 1944 lads were slated to end their schedule yesterday with a return engagement with the Albemarle American Legion Juniors, but the encounter was called off.

Ending the season was the clash with Thomasville on May 19. The visitors edged out the Whirlies, 3-2, in what was principally a pitcher's duel between Jim Staton of the Whirlies and Jack Gillian of the Thommies.

Three quick Thomasville runs in the first inning stood the rest of the way against two for Greensboro in the second stanza. Each of the opposing pitchers allowed five hits.

On May 16, the Whirlies turned back Albemarle's Legion Juniors, 4-2, in a 10-inning affair. Carlson Howerton gave up six scattered hits, never more than two in an inning. Jack Elkins drove in the two winning runs with a clean single in the 10th. At shortstop Jimmy Fleet handled eight chances without a miscue and made two hits for five times at bat.

Greensboro's biggest disappointment of the season was in High Point's punting of Whirlie hopes for the Western class A conference championship in the opening round. The Black Bison—a team that the Whirlies had twice beaten—handed them an 8-5 setback.

Only three days before, the Whirlies defeated the Pointers 5-3 in a conference preview.

In the previous game Carlson Howerton gave up only four scattered hits and sewed up his own ball game by making three runs while getting two hits for four times at the plate. Howerton, who struck out 11 Bison batters, refused to give a single hit until the seventh frame.

Back to avenge this defeat, High Point pulled the tourney's biggest upset in ousting the Whirlies in the first round on May 11. The Pointers grabbed a 3-4 lead in the first inning and never relinquished it.

Leon Wolfe, little righthander, was relieved in the sixth by Howerton during a Bison scoring spree. Howerton stopped the spree, which had upped the Pointers' score to eight runs, but the Whirlwind was unable to overtake their Guilford county arch-rivals.
