Current files of clippings, pictures, college catalogs and back issues of all magazines (*Reader's Guide to Periodical Literature*) help in the study of many courses. Another popular feature of the study-hall vagabonds is the magazine rack which generally displays current magazines.

The bulletin boards play a big part in the appearance and impression of the library for they are up to date accounts of happenings, new books, or current activities. Clippings, magazines, and other materials are displayed to best advantage in order to interest the passer-by.
