

## Ruby Yarber Speaks On Business Subjects For D. O. Members

April 9, Mrs. Ruby J. Yarber from Pilot Life Insurance Company spoke to the D.O. office group on entering the business world.

In her speech Mrs. Yarber pointed out the essentials for achieving success in today's business world. She told the three D.O. office practice groups that appearance, personality, and skill are all important in keeping a job. In addition, an employee should be neat and clean in appearance at all times.

The necessity of a pleasant personality is strong. It combines cooperation, friendliness, good attitude, patience, humility, and ability to get along with other people.

"Without skill of some kind, you could not hold a job very long. You must have the technical skills and ambition to do the work," said Mrs. Yarber.

To end her talk, she stated that it is never wise to go job hunting. An analysis of hobbies or interests can lead to a job that proves more favorable than one chosen in a haphazard way.

## Seniors Apply To Colleges Throughout United States

Greensboro Senior High School's graduating seniors have applied this year to many colleges—some of which are scattered all over the United States.

Out of a class of approximately 500, 353 transcripts have been sent to various colleges. Of these 353, 237 seniors have been accepted and now know which college they will attend.

### 56 Apply At One School

Beginning with Agnes Scott and continuing through Woman's College, as many as 56 students have applied to one particular school while only one person has applied to many others.

Two seniors have applied to Agnes Scott, eight at Appalachian State Teachers College, and one each to Bob Jones, Boston Conservatory, and Brevard. Campbell and Catawba are each expecting two GHS graduates while Centenary Junior expects one, Citadel one and Converse, five.

There will be two Greensboro students attending Darlington School For Boys, one attending Davidson, and 11 attending Duke. Six seniors plan to enter East Carolina, while one person will

attend Elon and one Georgia Tech. Two GHS graduates have been accepted at Greensboro College, while Guilford may claim 18. Hampton Sidney, High Point, Hollins, Lake Erie, and Lee Colleges will each have one Senior High alumni among their incoming Freshmen Class.

### Nursing Schools to Have 14

Three Greensboro students will attend Lees McRae; two will go to Mars Hill; and one each to Mary Washington, National Business College, and Northwestern. GHS will be represented by 14 students at nursing schools while Oberlin will have one representative. Randolph-Macon, three, and Richmond Professional Institute, one.

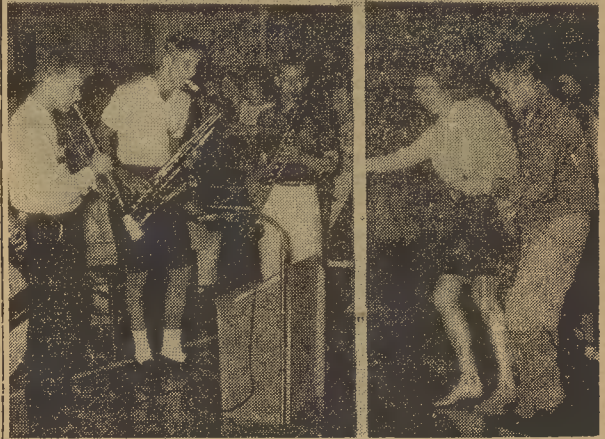
St. Mary's and Salem each expect five Senior High students. State expects 20, and both Stetson and Stratford expect two. Three GHS'ers will register at Sullins this fall, while two will register at Sweet Briar and one at both Tusculum and the University of Missouri.

### Large Number at University

The graduating class of 1960 at the University will include 27 members from Greensboro High School, while there will be 11 at Wake Forest.

Two of GHS's 1956 class will attend West Carolina, one plans to enter West Carolina, and one plans to enter Westhampton. Woman's College in Greensboro will claim the largest majority of the 237 Greensboro Senior High School students who have been accepted at the various colleges. Next year's Freshman Class roll will include 56 of Senior's graduating class.
