## Annual Christmas Pageant Will Climax Year

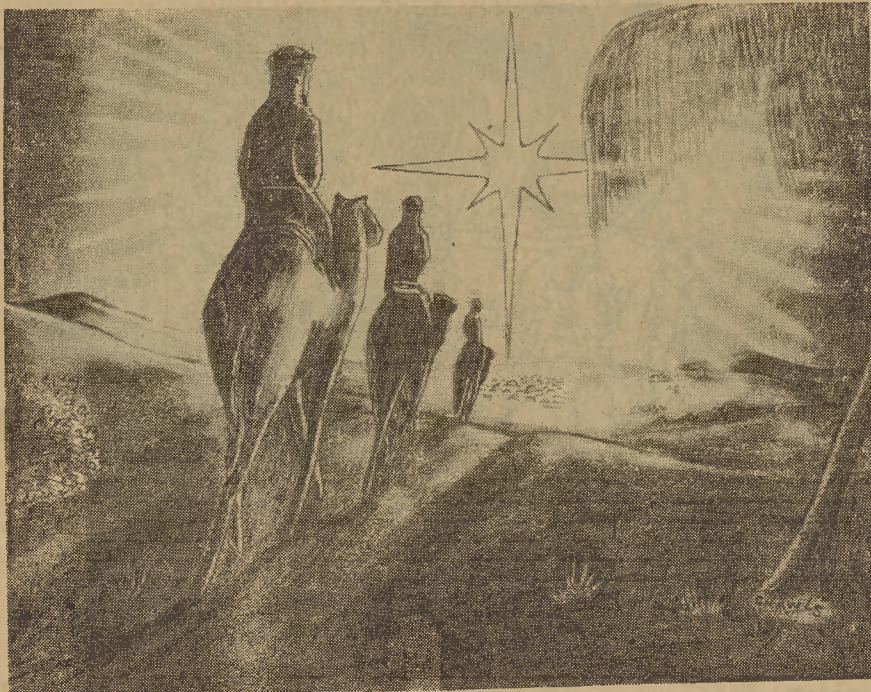
### Basketball, Wrestling Explained To Students
