Fifty Juniors To Take MeritScholarshipTest

About 50 GHS juniors will take the National Merit Scholarship from \$100 to \$1500 annually for Qualifying Test, to be administered nation-wide, Tuesday, April 20

\$5 Million Annually

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation, which is sponsored by 80 industries and foundations, 80 industries and foundations, plans to donate \$5 million in scholarships to high school students who will enter college in 1959. Previously the tests have been given during the first semester of the senior year, but the Corporation's stepped-up program calls for testing in the second semester of the junior year.

In the past at Senior High, students in the upper 10 per cent of their class have been allowed to apply for the test, but because of the complications involved in com-
